From the Principal's Desk

February 26, 2021

Hello SRA Families,

As I sat down and gathered my thoughts to write this message for The Guide this month, my mind traveled back to one year ago as we anticipated the effects of the predicted new virus and how it would affect the world. Would we have to go virtual? How long might we be away from school? It is kind of dreamlike now to even think it was going to be a short-term event back then. And so on...it is a bit surreal.

Well, here we are again, still thinking through, meeting, and discussing what each next event will look like and what interventions we have to have in place to keep our school healthy and safe. So, I wanted to take a moment to share some of those decisions made for the upcoming 4th quarter.

I met with the Covid Task Team and the faculty over the past few weeks to discuss two topics: the return of the 5day week and return with a virtual week after the Spring Break week.

First, **we will return to the 5-day week for the 4th quarter**. Those students who have been virtual for the entire year will be allowed to continue that learning platform for the 4th quarter, but Fridays will now return to a regular school day the week we return from Spring Break.

The more difficult decision has been how we handle the week after Spring Break. We were hoping our teachers would have had the opportunity to be vaccinated by this time of the year, but the vaccine rollout has been slow. Keeping our faculty and staff healthy and safe continues to be the instrumental factor in our decisions this year.

It is a concern for the SRA administration that vaccinations for our teachers/staff may not happen by the time we return from Spring Break. Still, after much discussion and discernment, Fr. John and I determined it is also essential to bring our students back to the classroom instruction. The week after Spring Break will be in-person instruction Monday through Friday.

We will require that if families have traveled on spring break, were in large or small gatherings outside of their households, without a mask, within 6 feet of one another, they are required to stay home five days upon their return. There is no judgment placed upon a family that may travel, but we ask for your support and compliance to continue to offer a safe environment for all.

For " Career Day" we wore clothes to represent what we would like to be when we grow up. We celebrated by dressing up like our grandparents.










Catholic Schools week was a lot of fun! Thank you parents and teachers who have made it possible for us to have so much fun and fond memories.

Miss Patti Woods: English (4 & 5) Religion (4 & 7) Social Studies (4)

In fourth and fifth grade English classes, all students have recently completed the unit on verbs and are moving on to the next unit on adjectives. We will also be working on our next essay which is a comparison/ contrast essay.

In seventh grade religion, classes are focusing on getting ready to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation.

In fourth grade religion, we are continuing our studies of the Ten Commandments.

In fourth grade social studies, we are continuing our studies of the regions of the United States.

Mrs. Amanda Knauer: Religion, Math, Reading, Vocabulary/Spelling (4-5)

Fifth Grade: The fifth graders have been focusing on the Sacraments of Healing. They learned how Jesus can heal us of our sins during Reconciliation and how God can heal people both physically and spiritually during the Anointing of the Sick. During math, the students have been focusing on multiples, divisibility rules, exponents, and factors all to help prepare for the upcoming chapters on fractions. The students are enjoying reading *Bud, Not Buddy.* Talking about the twists and turns in the novel leads to great discussion!

Fourth Grade: The fourth graders are continuing to work on mastering the tough skill of long division. I have loved seeing their progress and how excited they get "when the light bulb finally comes on." In literature, the students are enjoying reading the book *Shiloh*. After every couple of chapters, the students discuss and write about important themes and topics.

Mrs. Dana Lahm: Science/STREAM (4-5-6-7-8)

4th grade has been studying how the processes of weathering, erosion, and deposition form rocks. Currently, students are learning about the different types of fossils and rocks.

5th grade has been learning about light, color, and the visible light spectrum. Currently, students are studying the concept of the sun as earth's source of energy and light.

6th, 7th, & 8th grade students are working on their St. Louis Science Fair projects. The science fair projects are due no later than March 8th.



Mr. John McDermott: Physical Education

This month we have been working on kicking skills at every grade level. We have used various games to teach these skills. We have played games like longball, pin mania, and soccer to work on these skills. With the nicer weather coming, (and hopefully staying) we will have the chance to get outside and practice even more.



Mrs. Christy Connor: Religion (6 & 8) Social Studies (5-8)

Religion: In grade 6, we have completed a unit on the Judges of the Old Testament and will begin a unit on the Kings. In grade 8, we are continuing with Church history. We are currently learning about the Catholic Church in the Middle Ages.

Social Studies: Students in grade 6 have just begun a chapter about the continent of Africa. We are studying about Africa's geography. In seventh grade, we are beginning to study the United States Constitution. In grade 8, we are learning about imperialism leading up to the start of World War I. Students in grade 5 are completing a unit about Westward Expansion in the United States.

Miss Ashley Schaaf Standard Math & Challenge Math (6-7-8) Pre Algebra, (7-8) Algebra (7-8)

In standard math we are exploring basic geometric components.

In challenge math we are covering data representation.

In pre-algebra we are exploring polynomials.

In algebra we are also exploring polynomials, but in a greater complexity than in pre-algebra.

Mrs. Sioux Roslawski: Literature & English (6-7-8) Civitas

The 6th, 7th and 8th graders are participating in Civitas this year. Civitas is a model UN program. The students each chose a country that is a member of the United Nations. They have done some research (and will do more) as they determine how they--as delegates representing their new country--can make the world a better place. If their country has some wealth and does not have to deal with natural disasters or human rights issues, they will work to help less fortunate countries. If they are a nation that has many obstacles, they will create a resolution (a document) to "solve" one of those problems. Later in the spring, we will have a General Assembly and will present and defend some of our resolutions.

<u>ELA</u>

The 6th-8th graders are writing nonfiction pieces, along with some poetry. We will be working on essay writing next.
