To my fellow Missourians:

For over 20 years, the MOST 529 tuition savings program has empowered families in Missouri to save for higher education costs. As a father, I use the program to invest in my children's future. As Missouri State Treasurer, I manage the MOST program and work to encourage parents to open MOST accounts.

A MOST 529 tuition savings plan is an investment account sponsored by the State of Missouri. Up to \$16,000 (\$8,000 for single filers) in contributions are deductible from Missouri taxes every year and investments in the plan grow tax-free. When you use MOST funds for eligible expenses, you pay no taxes on the disbursement.

Starting in January 2018, the MOST 529 program is expanding to allow families to save and use funds in their accounts for elementary and secondary expenses. In addition to tuition, room and board, and other expenses at colleges and vocational schools, up to \$10,000 in private K-12 tuition now qualifies as an eligible expense. This means a family paying tuition at your school could save hundreds in Missouri taxes every year.

For the families at your school, this is a game changer. This means hardworking families will get a little bit more relief. Already my office has heard from parents who struggle to pay tuition now wanting to use the MOST 529 program for elementary and secondary education costs. The MOST Board recently affirmed our commitment to helping families save for their children's education at every level by passing a resolution recognizing the need to implement the aforementioned changes. NEW TAX BENEFIT FOR CATHOLIC SCHOOL PARENTS

Catholic school parents may benefit from the recent changes to the federal tax code. The recently passed federal tax law allows parents to make contributions to a child's Missouri 529 MOST account for K-12 tuition, in addition to expenses for higher education that are already permitted.

The Missouri 529 MOST account is an investment program sponsored by the Missouri State Treasurer's office. Anyone can open a MOST account, including parents, grandparents, or friends of K-12 or college-aged students. In this way, if parents lack financial resources, others can contribute to the family's MOST account.

Interest earnings on contributions made by parents to MOST accounts are not subject to state or federal taxes. Furthermore, qualified distributions from the account (those for higher education expenses, and now K-12 tuition) are also not taxed. Parents can withdraw up to \$10,000 annually for private K-12 tuition per student as an eligible distribution from a MOST account. Parents can elect to make contributions to the MOST account according to their own timetable, such as monthly.

Funds contributed to a MOST account are deducted from the parent's taxable income. For example, if a Catholic school parent contributes \$5,000 during the year to their child's MOST account, \$5,000 will be deducted from their taxable income for state tax purposes. Larger contributions to MOST accounts will further reduce taxable income.

Reducing taxable income, in turn, will reduce the state tax bill parents pay. (Other factors may affect the tax benefit realized, but this change in federal law will provide a real state tax benefit to Catholic school parents.) See following table:

Amount Contributed Account	Reduction in Taxable Income	Reduction in Tax Bill*
\$5,000	\$5,000	\$300
\$7,000	\$7,000	\$420
\$10,000	\$10,000	\$600

*Based on Missouri's highest tax rate of 6%; \$5,000 x 6% = \$300

Parents may want to consult with their local bank or financial advisor regarding the advisability of setting up a 529 MOST account.

6th, 7th, and 8th grade egg-speriment!










4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th Coding Unplugged- Lego Activity









4th grade is studying rocks and minerals. We are digging up facts about different kinds of minerals and types of rocks. We are just scraping the surface of how rocks are formed.

5th grade is studying matter. We are examining the three states of matter and what causes it to change from a solid, to a liquid, to a gas, and back. Soon we will go beyond a microscope to learn about what matter is made of... atoms!

6th, 7th, and 8th grade are studying cells. We began our unit by learning about the scientists who contributed to our understanding of cells, as well as the different types of microscopes that help us view cells today. We did an experiment with eggs to understand how a cell wall and cell membrane function. We are currently moving past the cell membrane and discovering what other organelles make up plant and animal cells.

Third Quarter has begun for Third Grade. We are ready for the challenges 2018 will bring. In English we have begun Chapter Four on Adjectives and Adverbs. We are enjoying some writing opportunities to use what we have learned. Each of us have been assigned a president to read and research. A report will be due on February 21. Ms. Polson is teaching us about time lines.

In Math class we are relating multiplication to division and trying to see patterns. We are working with fractions as well.

All of us enjoyed a story called <u>Penguin Chick</u> and some of us got to watch <u>March of the Penguins</u> (during the week many students were out with the flu). We look forward to Catholic School's Week.





Miss Patti Woods: English (4 - 8)

This month in English grades four through seven have been working hard on adjectives (modifiers) and will soon be taking the end of unit tests. The eighth graders have already completed this unit and have moved on to the next unit; *Capitalization and Punctuation*. Grades four through seven will soon follow along with the same unit.

Sixth and seventh graders will begin their next essay, a personal narrative. The eighth graders have already begun this essay and will be submitting their final copy the week of January 22nd when they return from their pilgrimage to DC.

Grades four and five will be learning how to write a formal letter as their main writing assignment.

Miss Amanda Imo: Religion, Math, Reading, Vocabulary/Spelling (4-5)

Fifth Grade: In Religion the students have been studying the parts of the Mass. We finished our unit by making posters summarizing all the information learned. During Math, the students worked on solving problems that included decimals. Now the students are focusing on multiples, divisibility rules, exponents, and factors all to help prepare for the upcoming chapters on fractions. The students are excited about their book club books. Many predictions and comments about the books continue to fill classroom discussions.

Fourth Grade: The fourth graders have been studying the Ten Commandments in Religion. This month we have been focusing on the fourth-sixth commandments. The students have been working hard on learning how to estimate and divide larger numbers. I have loved seeing "the light bulb come on" for several students. In Reading, the students read a short story about a fictional baseball game. We focused on technical words and how to summarize an event. They also read "The Turtle Who Wanted to Fly." With this story, the students worked on cause and effect.

Mrs. Christy Connor: Religion (6) Social Studies (4 - 8)

<u>Religion</u>: Students in grade six have learned about how the Israelites escaped from Egypt and eventually returned to Canaan. They also learned about the Ten Commandments. The students are currently working on the Beatitudes and will be learning about what happened to the Israelites once they finally entered Canaan.

Social Studies 4: Students are learning about the fifty states. They have also worked on some economics terms such as supply and demand, interest, and investment.

Social Studies 5: Students are learning about the regions of the United States. They are working on American History and will be completing sections about the colonies.

Social Studies 6: Grade Six students have completed work on ancient Egypt, ancient Greece, and ancient Rome. They are currently learning about life in the Middle Ages.

Social Studies 7: Seventh grade students have completed their study of the American Revolution as well as the writing and ratification of the U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights. They are currently learning about the administrations of George Washington and John Adams.

Social Studies 8: Students in grade eight have completed work on World War I, the Roaring Twenties, and the Great Depression. Later this week, they will begin to learn about the causes and effects of World War II.

History Day students should be staying after school more frequently now. History Day is February 24 at UMSL. History Day work on Saturdays is strongly encouraged.

Miss Ashley Schaaf: Standard Math & Challenge Math (6-7-8) Pre-Algebra, Algebra (7-8)

In Standard Math, we have finished up examining proportional relationships between quantities. Now we are just starting an introduction to basic geometry. This includes identifying points, lines, and angles.

In Challenge Math, we are wrapping up our chapter on percents. Next, we will be exploring different means of collecting and displaying data, as well introducing geometric figures.

In Pre-Algebra, we are delving into one of the most prevalent chapters - simplifying expressions and solving multi-step equations. These are concepts that form the basis of Algebra, which students will continue to see in high school.

In Algebra, we just took a chapter test over systems of equations. Up next is exponential functions and simplifying expressions using exponential properties.

Mrs. Jennifer Runiewicz: Literature (6-8) Religion (7-8)

Thank you for your prayers and support for the 8th grade students, chaperones, and me while on the Pro-life Pilgrimage to Washington, DC. As always, our trip was truly an inspirational journey where we learned more about the love of God for each of us, the value in each other, and the need for more support in the Pro-life movement.

Literature classes have been reading *Night*(8th), *The Boy in the Striped Pajamas* (7th), and *Daniel's Story* (6th). All three are stories about the horrible events of the Holocaust of WWII. All classes will read a 2nd Holocaust book to end the quarter; *Between Shades of Gray*(8th), *The Book Thief* (7th), and *Anne Frank, The Diary of a Young Girl* (6th). Please encourage students to read every night and discuss the events that they've read. Many of the topics are quite troubling.

During this last month, 8th grade religion has focused on exploring the history of the Church starting with the builders of the early Church. We also learned about Mary being the perfect example of what holiness looks like. Our next unit will begin responding with love, being agents of grace, and being holy men and women in our changing world,

7th grade religion has been learning *a*bout the spiritual journey, a personal faith journey that is developed through a growing friendship with Jesus and that will be completed in the fullness of eternal life. We will begin our Confirmation preparation this month.

Vocabulary Workshop schedule should be taped/stapled to your student's vocabulary book cover or in their assignment notebooks. I have also shared the schedule with each of them on Google Drive. Unit 9 test is Thursday, February 1st.
