Covid-19 Update

Thank you to all of our families who communicated with the school when they experienced Covid-19 within their family. I was able to update those families of the new St. Louis Department of Health Guidelines for Covid-19; however, not all may be aware of the new guidelines as of January 7th, 2022.

**Please note the DOH guidance indicates the following:

Individuals who cannot wear a mask appropriately must quarantine for ten (10) days. At St. Raphael the Archangel, this will apply to our Preschool children.

Change in Communication with Families Regarding COVID-19

Grade-level communication: As we move forward, we will continue to notify grade levels of COVID-19 positive cases that impact other classmates directly. If there are student COVID-19 positive cases within a household but are isolated to that household, they will not be communicated to the grade level but instead included in whole school totals. We will share school-wide communication at the end of the week.

School-wide communication: School-wide communication will include the number of COVID-19 positive cases in total. It will not include counts of direct contacts. Here is what to expect.

The Beyond Sunday Scholarship application process ends on February 28th, 2022. Families seeking tuition assistance must first apply to the Today & Tomorrow Education Fund.

4th and 5th graders have recently completed their unit in English on adjectives and have just begun writing an opinion essay.

4th graders have just finished sharing their timeline projects and will continue learning about the Civil War and slavery.

Mrs. Amanda Knauer: Religion, Math, Reading, Vocabulary/Spelling (4-5)

Fifth Grade: The fifth graders have been focusing on the Sacraments of Healing. They learned how Jesus can heal us of our sins during Reconciliation and how God can heal people both physically and spiritually during the Anointing of the Sick. During Math, the students have been focusing on multiples, divisibility rules, exponents, and factors all to help prepare for the upcoming chapters on fractions. Book Club has been the topic of discussion during Literature class. The students enjoy making predictions and discussing their books with their group.

Fourth Grade: In Math, the students are becoming experts at dividing numbers with 1-digit divisors. They are also working on finding patterns, multiples, and factors. The students read "The Turtle Who Wanted to Fly." With this story, the students worked on cause and effect. They also read a story about a smart but over-confident fourth grader and her experience with a class assignment. We worked on character traits and making reasonable predictions.

Mr. Leonard Kraudel: Science/STREAM (4-5-6-7-8)

6-7-8 Grade are learning Rocks and Minerals.

5th grade just finished making a Yellowstone Food Web Poster.

4th grade are learning adaptations of Animals and Plants for survival.



Mr. John McDermott: Physical Education

This January we have been working on throwing and catching games across the grade levels as well as starting soccer. We are practicing dribbling, passing, shooting, and defending through games and drills.





Mrs. Christy Connor: Religion (6 & 8) Social Studies (5-8)

In religion classes, the sixth grade is learning how the Israelites returned to the Promised Land after years of wandering in the desert. The eighth grade is studying how the early Church fathers helped civilization survive after the fall of the Roman Empire.

In social studies, students in grades 5, 7, and 8 are learning about various times in American history. Grades 5 and 7 are looking at the early English colonies and are beginning to study the American Revolution. Students in Grade 6 are just beginning to look at some of the ancient African kingdoms.

Mr. Zach Almeida: Standard Math & Challenge Math (6-7-8) Pre Algebra, (7-8) Algebra (7-8)

Challenge: Students are creating and interpreting different forms of displaying data, and calculating measures of central tendency.

Pre-Algebra: Students are finding probabilities for independent and dependent events.

Algebra 1: Students are applying properties of exponents to simplify expressions.

Algebra 2: Students are solving Quadratic Equations using the Quadratic Formula, and determining the nature of its roots by evaluating the discriminant.

Mrs. Sioux Roslawski: Literature & English (6-7-8)

The 8th, 7th and 6th graders are beginning to read short stories. The authors include O. Henry, Edgar Allen Poe and Shirley Jackson. All three classes are working on informational writing.

The following students have been practicing as they prepare for the Bellarmine Speech Meet, which will be held on January 29: Addison Pfeiffer, Clara Thompson, Helen Potts, James Browning and Claire Fuhr. They have done a fabulous job of memorizing their pieces, and are bringing them to life with facial expressions, movement and voice inflection. What kind of ribbons will they earn? You'll have to read the next issues of the Guide to find out.

Lilly Bick won a silver award in the Scholastic Writing Contest for her poem. Hundreds of pieces were submitted across the entire state, so Lilly's win is something she should be extremely proud of. Congrats, Lilly Bick!
