
Upcoming Student Council Events

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Mrs. Kathy Doty: Music

<u>Kindergarten</u>- We just completed talking about and singing dynamics. Students will be learning about long and short sounds in music (ta and ta-ah notes have a longer sound) TITI (eighth notes are short), playing and singing rhythm patterns with long and short sounds.

First Grade- Students will finish with "Ways To Use My Voice." First grade will begin learning a counting song sung in a "March" style and using rhythming words.

<u>Second Grade-</u> Students have begun learning "Down the Ohio." Students are identifying notes that skip, step and repeat. We are singing, playing resonator bells and also learning notes on the staff (line and space notes.) <u>Third grade-</u> Discovering different ways a song is written and sung; call and response, verse and refrain, etc., also learning line and space notes on the staff, alike and different phrases of a song, and playing resonator bells. We are also comparing songs that are about the same topic (transportation, trains)

Fourth grade- We are learning what a scale is, how they are built (what is their formula), differences between scales (ex; major, chromatic, pentatonic), playing resonator bells to hear the difference between whole steps and half steps (black keys).

<u>Fifth grade</u> is learning uneven time signatures (in 5's,7's), calypso music, using our African drums and their different "timbres" due to the different sizes, and layering a song.

<u>Sixth through eighth</u> is learning chords in a song, where they are located (who can play a chord? guitar, keyboards), singing songs already known or new and playing the chords on the resonator bells. We discussed and sang Auld Lang <u>Syne</u> (sung after the ball drops). Students are creating lyrics to go with the melody. They are working in groups.

Mr. John Bruno: Physical Education

I hope all the students enjoyed their holiday break and wish everyone a Happy New Year. The students over the last few weeks were working on basketball skills. Skills included dribbling, shooting, passing and small group basketball activities. I have introduced games the students seemed to enjoy and made basketball a fun filled activity, even for those that do not regularly play this sport.

I have been very impressed with the primary grades' basketball skills. They have quickly picked up the skills of dribbling, passing, and shooting. I want to encourage them to keep on working to further develop these skills. Let's keep up the good work!


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Kindergarten News: Lu Ann Domijan

Third grade has been working very hard this New Year 2019. We are reading and researching our president. In social studies, we are learning about important leaders, male and female, of the American Revolution. We are very busy planning two all school masses for January 17 and February 1, Grandparent's Day. In science, we have studied consumers and producers, food chains, and ecosystems. We played a fun card game, Predator and Prey. We had two big chapter tests: English, adjectives and adverbs on Jan 23 and multiplication in math on January 24, which has proven we know more now than we did in 2018! We are excited about our SRA Scholastic Book Fair, January 24-February 1.

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Miss Patti Woods: English (4 - 8)

We are moving right along in English in grades four through eight. Grades 4 and 5 just finished units on adjectives and have taken the unit tests. Sixth grade just completed the unit on verbs and have taken the unit test. Grade seven has just completed the unit on modifiers and will soon begin their unit on capitalization and punctuation. Grade eight will soon be finishing up their unit on modifiers and then moving onto capitalization and punctuation. All 5 English classes are working on essays also. Grades 4 is working on an opinion essay. Grades 5-8 are working on a compare/contrast essay.

We all had a great Catholic Schools Week. Thank you for all who have contributed in any way!

Miss Amanda Imo: Religion, Math, Reading, Vocabulary/Spelling (4-5)

Fifth Grade: In religion the students have been studying the parts of the Mass. We finished our unit by making posters summarizing all the information learned. The students are beginning learning about the Sacraments of Healing. During math, the students worked on solving problems that included decimals. Now they are focusing on multiples, divisibility rules, exponents, and factors all to help prepare for the upcoming chapters on fractions. The students have been excited about their book club books. Many predictions and comments about the books have filled classroom discussions.

Fourth Grade: The students have been working hard on learning how to estimate and divide larger numbers. They also have been working on finding factors, multiples, and patterns with numbers. The students read <u>The Turtle Who Wanted to Fly</u>. With this story, the students worked on cause and effect. They also read a tall tale about how popcorn was created. After reading the story, they used it as inspiration to create their own tall tales!



Mrs. Christy Connor: Religion (6) Social Studies (4-8)

Religion: We have reviewed the Ten Commandments and have learned about the journey that the Israelites made through the desert to reach Canaan. We are about to find out how the Israelites entered Canaan and what they had to do to regain their territory.

Social Studies 4: We are continuing to learn about the fifty states and are working on note-taking skills. A unit about Europeans and African Americans in Missouri is being completed with a slide show about Ste. Genevieve, Missouri.

Social Studies 5: We are continuing to learn about the major state regions in the United States.

We are also learning information about the colonies and will soon begin to look at the American Revolution.

Social Studies 6: Our class is learning about the Middle Ages in Europe. We are about to complete our coats of arms and will be continuing to work on a slide presentation about Medieval cathedrals and castles.

Social Studies 7: Our class is working on a project about the Lewis and Clark expedition into the Louisiana Purchase territory. We are also learning how the United States

dealt with problems that they faced from France and Great Britain.

Social Studies 8: We are about to complete our research paper that includes footnotes and bibliography. In history, we are beginning to learn about the Cold War and

how it affected the United States.

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Miss Ashley Schaaf Standard Math & Challenge Math (6-7-8) Pre Algebra, Algebra (7-8)

In Standard math, we will be starting with the basics of geometry.

In Challenge math, we will briefly explore ways of displaying data (bar graphs, line plots, etc.)

In Pre-Algebra, we will be starting our last chapter in the textbook covering polynomials.

In Algebra, we will be finishing up with factoring and simplifying polynomials, and moving on to quadratic functions.

Mrs. Jennifer Runiewicz: Literature (6-8) Religion (7-8)

Thank you for your prayers and support for the 8th grade students, Mrs. Rizos, and me while on the Pro-life Pilgrimage to Washington, DC. As always, our trip was truly an inspirational journey where we learned more about the love of God for each of us, the value in each other, and the need for more support in the Pro-life movement.

Literature classes have finished our first Holocaust books: *Night*(8th), *The Boy in the Striped Pajamas* (7th), and *Daniel's Story* (6th). All three are stories about the horrible events of the Holocaust of WWII. All classes will read a 2nd Holocaust book to end the quarter; *Between Shades of Gray*(8th), *The Book Thief* (7th), and *Anne Frank, The Diary of a Young Girl* (6th). Please encourage students to read every night and discuss the events that they read about. Many of the topics are quite troubling.

During this last month, 8th grade religion has focused on exploring the history of the Church starting with the builders of the early Church. We also learned about Mary being the perfect example of what holiness looks like. Our next unit will begin responding with love, being agents of grace, and being holy men and women in our changing world.

7th grade religion has been learning about the spiritual journey, a personal faith journey that is developed through a growing friendship with Jesus and that will be completed in the fullness of eternal life. We have also begun our Confirmation preparation this month.

Vocabulary Workshop schedule should be taped/stapled to your student's vocabulary book cover or in their assignment notebooks. I have also shared the schedule with each of them on Google Drive. Unit 9 test is Thursday, February 14th.



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
