



Desserts--Baked and Frozen



Mrs. Amanda Knauer: Religion, Math, Reading, Vocabulary/Spelling (4-5)

Fifth Grade: In religion, the students have been studying the parts of the Mass. We have studied all of the parts now and then talked about how we can all glorify the Lord by our actions. During math, the students worked on solving problems that included decimals. During literature, the students are reading the book <u>Bud, But not Buddy.</u> It is about a boy who is on a journey to find his father. I love hearing predictions as we go!

Fourth Grade: The students have been working hard on multiplying large numbers. We have also started working on division. The students read "The Turtle Who Wanted to Fly." With this story, the students worked on cause and effect. They also read a story about a smart, but overconfident fourth grader and her experience with a class assignment. We worked on character traits and making reasonable predictions.

Mrs. Dana Lahm: Science/STREAM (4-5-6-7-8)

4th grade has been studying how the processes of weathering, erosion, and deposition are constantly changing Earth's landforms.

5th grade has been learning how to use physical properties in order to classify the different states of matter. Additionally, students are studying how phase change provides evidence of atomic theory.

6th, 7th, & 8th grade have been studying cell theory, cell structure, and function, and the biological levels of organization in living organisms.

Mr. John McDermott: Physical Education

In January, with the start of the Blues' season, we have been working on hockey skills. This includes puck handling, passing, and shooting. Also, we have been playing hockey games with most of the grades.







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Mrs. Christy Connor: Religion (6 & 8) Social Studies (5-8)

Students in sixth grade religion will be learning how the Israelites returned to Canaan and what they had to do to take back the land. We will also be focusing on the Ten Commandments. Eighth grade religion students are beginning to learn about the early history of the Catholic Church.

Students in fifth grade social studies have completed their work with the Bill of Rights and are learning about Lewis and Clark and the Corps of Discovery. In grade six social studies, we are beginning to study about ancient Rome. Grade seven social study students are completing their study of the American Revolution and will begin to look at the creation of the United States Constitution. Eighth grade social students will be completing work on the Gilded Age and will begin learning about the Progressive Era.

Miss Ashley Schaaf Standard Math & Challenge Math (6-7-8) Pre Algebra, (7-8) Algebra (7-8)

In standard math, we are working with proportions.

In challenge math, we are working with proportions and percents.

In pre-algebra we are exploring linear equations.

In algebra we are working with systems of equations.

Mrs. Sioux Roslawski: Literature & English (6-7-8)
