Dear SRA Families,

As we end our Lenten journey, we now prepare over the next three days to celebrate the Risen Jesus on Easter Sunday. Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil are unique traditions in our Church. As your child's first educator, sharing family time at one or more of these services will also provide a rich faith experience for your child and you.

Our Easter Break runs from Holy Thursday, March 28, through Easter Monday, April 1. That's the truth, not an April Fools joke. Classes will resume on Tuesday, April 2.

April brings many, many events, so I will highlight a few that take place once we return.

Thursday, April 4—Springtime is here! The Cardinals' Home Opener is on this day, so in honor of this St. Louis tradition, students may wear their favorite Cardinal shirt or red shirt with their uniform.

Friday, April 5—Spring Picture Day—Students may dress up in their Easter best on this day. For our preschool families who are not attending school on Friday, the photo session usually begins between 8:45 and 9:00 AM. ***Note this is a different date from the original school calendar. The photographer had to change the date.

Monday, April 8 - Solar Eclipse - The school purchased approved glasses to view the eclipse that afternoon. A family permission slip was sent home today in the packet. The school will prepare the students on the proper way to view the eclipse but must give the school permission to allow their child to participate. Only students with signed permission slips will be allowed outside during the eclipse. We were able to view the last eclipse in 2017-18, and it was a pretty cool experience. Hopefully, the weather cooperates that day.

April also brings the **Sacraments of First Holy Communion** for our 2nd graders on April 21 at 11:00 AM Mass and **Confirmation** for our 7th graders on April 30 at 7:00 PM.

Bow Sundays—St. Raphael has the tradition of presenting our 2nd graders (April 7) and 7th graders (April 14) with a white/red bow in honor of receiving their upcoming Sacrament. They receive the bows after 9:00 AM Mass on their respective day. The families display the bows on their front door so the community can see them, and then they pray for the students as they prepare for their special day. Please keep these students in your prayers this month.

Pre-K: They finished their Four Leaf Clovers and they will be finishing some bunny rabbits and an Easter Scene with an Easter egg!

<u>Kindergarten-1st:</u> These students created St. Patrick's Day artwork along with Palm Sunday Watercolor paintings. They will finish off the month with an Easter scene with an Easter egg along with a colorful spindle of Jesus Rising!

Miss Patti Woods: English (4 & 5) Religion (4 & 7) Social Studies (4) Literature (4)

4th Grade Religion: We just finished our unit on the Ten Commandments and are moving on to our next unit. We will learn about the Beatitudes.

4th Grade English: We are working on the unit of adjectives.

4th Grade Social Studies: We are learning the five regions of the United States and identifying the states that are in each region.

4th Grade Literature: We are almost reaching the end of *The Watsons Go to Birmingham-1963* in class. The students are enjoying this novel!

5th Grade English: In class, we just finished writing and sharing personal narrative essays. Next, we will be beginning the unit on pronouns.

7th Grade Religion: We are close to finishing our preparation for the reception of the Sacrament of Confirmation. Students will be writing a letter to Bishop Rivituso, telling him why they want to receive the sacrament.

Students seem to be enjoying the elective classes we have begun in the upper grades. Here is a photo of games in the process of being made.



Mrs. Katie Meier: Religion (5), Math (4-6), Vocabulary/Spelling (4-5)

4th Grade Math—We are moving into relating fractions and decimals.

6th Grade Standard Math—We are learning and applying formulas for area and volume.

6th Grade Challenge Math—We are continuing to study the different types of graphs and when to use the different types.

5th Grade Religion—We are refreshing our memory on how to look up specific passages in the Bible.

5th Grade Literature—We are wrapping up our 4th novel of the year, <u>Esperanza Rising</u> with our culminating projects.

5th Grade Math—We are finishing our Fraction Era shortly after Easter Break and will be moving into Geometry.

5th Grade is also preparing for JA BizTown at the end of April as well as our culminating performance for Dancing Classrooms!

Mr. Leonard Kraudel: Science/STREAM (4-5-6-7-8)

In Science, 6th/7th/8th graders will be taking the final Test soon over the different Human Systems, circulatory, respiratory, digestive, etc... then will be starting on fossil records, natural selection and evolution (planned by God) and vestigial structures that have evolved over time.

5th grade started the Unit of Water and the Water Cycle and the importance of water quality and water conservation.

4th grade just started the Unit on Plate Tectonics, Earthquakes and Volcanoes.

Mrs. Christy Connor: Religion (6 & 8) Social Studies (5-8)

Religion: Students in grade six religion have begun to learn about the prophets. We will begin by studying the prophet Elijah.

Students in grade eight continue their study of Catholic Church history. We are currently learning about the changes that came about during the 18th and 19th centuries.

Social Studies: Students in grade six are exploring the cultures of South Asia.

In grade seven, the students are looking at the Maya, Aztecs, and Incas.

Fifth-grade students are beginning to work on the changes in American history that led to World War I. In eighth grade, we will be starting on the Progressive Era at the turn of the 20th century.

Mrs. Anne Stein: Standard Math & Challenge Math (6-7-8) Pre Algebra, (7-8) Algebra (7-8)

The middle school students are continuing to explore new topics in math. The 7th Grade Challenge class is learning about organizing and analyzing data. The Pre-Algebra class is working with theoretical and experimental probability. The Algebra I class is beginning to study operations with polynomials. The Algebra II class is continuing to study quadratic equations and their graphs.

Mrs. Sioux Roslawski: Literature & English (6-7-8)

6th-8th ELA

The middle-schoolers are working feverishly on their Civitas resolutions. (Civitas is a model UN program here in St. Louis.) The students have each chosen a country, they have done research to find a problem/ issue they can help "resolve" and now they are working on their action plan: what they are going to do, how they are to fund it, how are they going to evaluate it, and they are going to create a timeline.

The 6th graders are beginning the book *Maniac Magee*. The 7th and 8th graders are both beginning novels that are told via free verse poetry.
