Dear St. Raphael School Families,

Thanks to so many of you for your well wishes as I begin my transition to St. Clare of Assisi School. I truly appreciate the heartfelt congratulations and support that I've received from so many parents and parishioners.

We will also be experiencing a faculty change in our PE program. It was decided that our school would be better served by having one full-time PE teacher rather than two part-time PE teachers. 
St. Louis Hills Neighborhood Association Annual Scholarship

Mrs. Diane Gewinner: Learning Consultant <u>INCREASING STUDENT READING TIME IMPROVES COMPREHENSION</u> Article taken from THE JOURNAL by Lelia Meyer 11/17/16

The majority of students spend fewer than 15 minutes per day reading. Increasing their daily reading time to 30 minutes, can improve comprehension and boost student achievement according to Renaissance Learning's Accelerated Reader 360 software for managing and monitoring student reading. The report found that 54% of students read for less than 15 minutes per day and are exposed to approximately 1.5 million words. On the other end of the spectrum, 18% of students read for more than 30 minutes per day and are exposed to 13.7 million words throughout their K-12 schooling. Miss Amanda Imo: Reading, Math (4-5)

Fifth Grade: The Fifth Graders have been discussing the Sacrament of Matrimony. We have talked about what it means to vow to love someone for the rest of their lives and how God gives the couple a special grace to help them work through the good and bad times. In Math the students have been diligently working on how to multiply and divide fractions and mixed numbers. During Reading the students have enjoyed discussing their latest Book Club book. There are a lot of great conversations taking place in our classroom.

Fourth Grade: The Fourth Graders have been working on adding and subtracting fractions with like denominators. They are getting a clearer understanding of fractions and how they work. The students have been working on their compare and contrast paper for <u>Shiloh</u>. They are doing a great job figuring how to organize their thoughts.

Mrs. Christy Connor: Social Studies & Religion (6-7-8)

English: Grades Six, Seven and Eight completed the unit on verbs this week. They are now beginning the unit on modifiers, including adjectives and adverbs. Students in all classes will also be working more on sentence diagramming.

Social Studies: Grade Six students are continuing their study of Europe in the Middle Ages. They are learning how people lived in those days, as well as how a young man became a knight. The class will begin working on their own coat of arms.

Grade Seven students completed the unit about Lewis and Clark and the Corps of Discovery and will be starting the unit concerning Jacksonian Democracy.

Grade Eight students will begin their study concerning the Vietnam War. They will also be learning about some economic concepts, especially different types of taxes, and the concept of unemployment.

Sixth Grade Math

In Challenge Math we are finishing up percents, and are exploring percent of change and simple interest. In Standard Math we are wrapping up our unit on area, perimeter, surface area and volume. We will have a test before we leave for Spring Break.

Seventh Grade Math

In Challenge Math we are finishing up our basic geometry unit. We are exploring transformations and symmetry. In Standard Math we are wrapping up our unit on ratios, rates and proportional relationships. We will have a test before we leave for spring break.

Eighth Grade Math

In Challenge Math we are continuing our work with polynomials - multiplying and factoring. In Standard Math we are investigating the difference between rational and irrational numbers.

Sixth Grade Science

We started a new book, *Environmental Science*. We are wrapping up Chapter 1 and will take a test before we leave for Spring Break.

Seventh Grade Science

Students are working on differentiating between the different parts of the ocean. They are also building an ocean habitat.

Eighth Grade Science

We are continuing our study of cells and exploring how they carry out the processes of photosynthesis and respiration.

Mrs. Jennifer Runiewicz: Literature (6-7-8)

Literature: This quarter we begin our journey to The Globe Theater and the works of William Shakespeare. We will learn about alliteration, assonance, consonance and iambic pentameter. We will also learn about Shakespeare's life and the Elizabethan Age.

Vocabulary Workshop schedule should be taped/stapled to their vocabulary book cover or in their assignments books. I've also shared the schedule with each of them on Google Drive. Our Unit 13 spelling and a vocabulary test will be Wednesday, April 12th.
