Boys Who Sit Still Have a Harder Time Learning to Read Health Research by Belinda Luscombe

Anybody who has seen boys tear through a hall, run around a playground, or ricochet off classroom walls, knows that they are exhausting. According to a Finnish study, this is all helping them to be better to be better readers. The study released November 30, 2016 in the *Journal of Medicine and Sport*, found that the more time children spend sitting in Grade One, the less time they spend being physically active, the fewer gains they make in reading during the next two years. In First Grade, a lot of sedentary time and no running around also had a negative impact on their ability to do math. Among girls, sitting for a long period of time without moving much didn't seem to have any effect on their ability to learn. The connection between exercise and learning is not new, but this study provides stronger evidence that the increased emphasis on sedentary academic activity among the youngest learners may be fruitless if it comes at the cost of physical activity.

If the circle of students had the number needed to represent the number on the board the remaining students (or leftovers) went to sit in the refrigerator. The students' number sense is on track.

This past week the students worked with small parachutes that require them to work in groups of 4-



First Graders just finished their 3rd quarter reading assessments. The 3rd quarter and 4th quarter assessments are done later because these are the quarters students typically solidify their foundation skills and show the most growth. The 4th quarter assessment will be completed during the final weeks of school. This



will show a full picture of each child's reading growth over the whole academic year and help Ms. Amsler to best prepare for her incoming students. I am so proud to share that <u>EVERY</u> student in First Grade showed significant growth from 2nd to 3rd quarter! As a teacher, I am beaming-our students are so proud of their efforts and I hope that you are too!

Second Grade News: Miss Stephanie Amsler

It is the last week of Third Quarter. The year has flown by. Second Grade is busy learning about the Liturgy of the Eucharist and the items used during Mass in preparation for First Communion on Sunday, April 30th.

We continue our unit about animals as we research different animals that live in different habitats. We are also discussing why certain animals are able to survive in their habitats.



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Third Grade News: Ms. Susan Polson

Third Grade read an informational article about Egypt and King Tut. We answered some questions independently about what we read (skills such as: sequencing, finding main idea, supporting details and citing evidence from the text). We are studying the 50 states, their region and shapes. We tried guessing the name of some states in Morse Code after reading about the inventor, Samuel Morse. Elapsed time is a difficult concept in time telling but we love a challenge. Speaking of a challenge, Mrs. Martin has given us one in "Jump Rope for Heart." We had fun on the playground Tuesday afternoon .

Miss Patti Woods: Social Studies, Science, English (4-5)

In Fourth Grade English we continue to focus on pronouns, relative pronouns and antecedents. In Social Studies, now that our journey west with Lewis and Clark has come to an end, we will begin learning about the Civil War and how it affected our great nation. In Science we will be trying out some computer coding skills using our new Ozobot.

In Fifth Grade English we will continue working on our unit of capitalization and punctuation. In Science we are also learning some coding skills using the Ozobot. In Social Studies we are working on the geographic regions of the United States.

Miss Amanda Imo: Reading, Math (4-5)

Fifth Grade: The Fifth Graders are learning about how God calls each of us individually to a vocation. During Math the students learned how to add and subtract mixed numbers. The Fifth Graders have been very excited to share their Historical Figure Projects and learn from their peers about important people in history.

Fourth Grade: The Fourth Graders have continued to work hard on comparing and ordering fractions. The more we practice the easier it is getting for the students. The students finished reading <u>Shiloh</u>. They loved finding out how it ended. The students are going to watch the movie <u>Shiloh</u> and compare and contrast the book to the movie.

Mrs. Christy Connor: Social Studies & Religion (6-7-8)

English: All classes will be completing their unit on verbs this week. Next week they'll all begin the unit on modifiers.

Social Studies:

Grade Six students have begun the unit on Medieval Europe. They are learning about how the fall of the Roman Empire led to the development of feudalism.

Grade Seven students are continuing their study of the Lewis and Clark expedition. They will be looking at the list of supplies that the Corps of Discovery took with them on their journey as well as a letter written by Meriwether Lewis to his mother, Lucy Marks.

Grade Eight students will be completing the unit on civil rights in the United States. They are learning that civil rights are extended to all groups of people. They groups that they are studying include the elderly, Mexican Americans, the disabled, African Americans and Native Americans.

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Mrs. Laura Berns: Science (6-7-8) Standard Math (6-7-8) Miss Ashley Schaaf: Science (6-7-8) Challenge Math (6&7) Algebra 8

Sixth Grade Math

In Challenge Math we are converting between fractions, decimals, and percents. We are also exploring solving percents.

In Standard Math we are wrapping up our unit on area, perimeter, surface area and volume.

Seventh Grade Math

In Challenge Math we are continuing with components of geometry. We are exploring angle and side measures, as well as congruence.

In Standard Math we are continuing to work with percentages.

Eighth Grade Math

In Challenge Math we are exploring polynomials and learning to factor and multiply them.

In Standard Math we are working on solving a variety of problems involving scientific notation.

Sixth Grade Science

Students just completed the vertebrate/invertebrate assessment. We started a new book, *Environmental Science*.

Seventh Grade Science

Students just completed a test over the ocean waters and are currently building an ocean habitat.

Eighth Grade Science

In Science this week we are taking a Chapter 1 test over Cells. Then we are exploring cell processes and energy.

Mrs. Jennifer Runiewicz: Literature (6-7-8)

<u>Literature:</u> As we wrap up the Third Quarter, we are also bringing our Holocaust unit to a close. Although it's been a very emotional unit, we have learned a great deal about the characters, both fictional and nonfictional and the struggles they faced during the reign of Adolf Hitler. The Eighth Grade will commence this unit by visiting a synagogue, the Holocaust Museum and the touring the Cathedral Basilica on Wednesday, March 15th.

<u>Vocabulary Workshop</u> schedule should be taped/stapled to their vocabulary book cover or in their assignments books. I've also shared the schedule with each of them on Google Drive. Our Unit 12 spelling vocabulary test will be Friday, March 17th.


