Third Grade News: Ms. Susan Polson

Miss Amanda Imo: Religion, Math, Reading, Vocabulary/Spelling (4-5)

Fifth Grade: The fifth graders have been studying the Sacrament of the Eucharist. We discussed where the Sacrament comes from and the meaning behind it. We are now going to go through each part of the Mass and discuss in depth why we do and say the things we do during the liturgy. During math, the students began their unit on decimals. They have learned how to read, write, order, and compare them. We are now working on solving problems that include decimals. In literature, the students have been very excited about "Book Club." Each student is expected to read a portion of the book and complete a job that they will share with the rest of the group. The jobs will help the students with asking questions, connecting text, summarizing, finding and learning the meaning of interesting words, and visualizing.

Fourth Grade: In math, the students have been diligently working on solving multiplication problems. I am so proud of how quickly and accurately the students can solve basic multiplication facts. During literature, the class is currently reading *There's A Boy in the Girl's Bathroom*. The students have enjoyed laughing about the characters and are discussing each part of the story in great detail.



Mrs. Christy Connor: Religion (6) Social Studies (4-8)

Religion: Our sixth grade students will begin a unit about Moses and the Exodus. They will learn about the ten plagues and how the Israelites escape from Egypt and slavery.

- SS 4: Fourth grade students are working on how state and local governments work. They are also learning about the Midwest states.
- SS 5: Students in grade five are learning about the New England, Middle, and Southern colonies. They are also discovering how the colonists came up with different ideas for self-government.
- SS 6: Grade six students will begin a unit on Asia with an emphasis on ancient India, Japan, and China. They will continue to work on geography skills, especially dealing with latitude and longitude.
- SS 7: Students in grade seven will begin the Citizenship Handbook. This deals with parts of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.
- SS 8: Eighth grade students are learning about some of the causes that led to the stock market crash and the Great Depression.

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Miss Ashley Schaaf Standard Math & Challenge Math (6-7-8) Pre Algebra, Algebra (7-8)

Standard Math

We have been working with fractions, and just finished up a chapter test. Next we will be exploring measures of central tendency and proportions.

Challenge Math - 7th grade

We have just started exploring ratios and unit rates.

Algebra

We have begun work with systems of equations. We are looking into the three ways of solving them.

Pre-Algebra

We just finished multi-step equations and inequalities, as well as systems of equations in its most basic form. We will be moving on to linear equations.

Challenge Math - 6th grade

We have started working with writing and finding ratios and units rates.

Mrs. Jennifer Runiewicz: Literature (6-8) Religion (7-8)

Literature classes have been reading *A Separate Peace* (8th), *And Then There Were None* (7th), and *Tangerine* (6th). All three are stories about mystery and life choices. These books will take us to the end of the quarter. Please encourage students to read every night. We will begin our Holocaust books when we return from Christmas break.

During this last month, 8th grade religion has focused on the Marks of the Church, One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic. In our next unit, we will begin to explore the history of the Church starting with the builders of the early Church. We will also learn about Mary being the perfect example of what holiness looks like.

7th grade religion has been learning *Jesus Christ the Truth*, where we learned from teachings and example of Christ how to live according to the commandments, the Beatitudes, and His new law of love, the Gospel. Our next unit, entitled *Jesus Christ the Life*, where we will study about the spiritual journey, a personal faith journey that is developed through a growing friendship with Jesus and that will be completed in the fullness of eternal life.

Vocabulary Workshop schedule should be taped/stapled to your student's vocabulary book cover or in their assignment notebooks. I have also shared the schedule with each of them on Google Drive. Unit 6 test is Thursday, December 6th and Unit 7 test is Tuesday, December 18th.
