Volunteers are so important to the success of our school children, so that's why anyone who works or volunteers with children must be compliant with the Safe Environment Program of the Archdiocese of Saint Louis set forth by the USCCB. (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops)

Compliance includes attending a Protecting God's Children Workshop, completing a Worker Registration Form to obtain a background check, and reading and signing a Code of Ethical Conduct. Each parish must have copies of individual background checks & code of ethics forms on file for all active volunteers and employees. Additional background checks may be necessary if you have lived out of state in previous years.

To register online for a Protecting God's Children Workshop, please visit www.archstl.org, scroll down and click on the Protecting God's Children link, then scroll down and click on View Workshops. You will be redirected to the VIRTUSOnline.org site to complete the registration process. The Code of Ethical Conduct and worker registration forms are available from your parish Child Safety Coordinator, Mary Steck (mary.a.steck@gmail.com) and may also be located on our parish website. If you have questions or need assistance with this process, please contact Mary or the Archdiocesan Safe Environment Program at 314-792-7272.

Missouri Background Checks are obtained when you begin your ministry and are updated every even numbered year. Please let the parish office know if you would like to be removed from the list of active volunteers. You must also contact the Missouri Family Care Safety Registry at 1-866-422-6872 with address changes.

Hello again, November has all but flown by us. The exciting work being done by the students in science is fun to see, not only their final products upon creation, but also their process in completing their work. Below is what each grade is currently in the midst of.


The 8th grade class is well into their final pieces of learning about the various different cells. Students are currently in the process of drafting a comic strip that must tell a story about the unique qualities and adaptations of both plant and animal cells. This synthesis of information requires students to bring together all they know of both cells and apply it in a more abstract way! Some comic strips I've already seen are off to an excellent start.

The 7th grade class is moving forward into the comic strip activity with the 8th graders as well. The students are expected to not only show me unique qualities and adaptations, but to create an illustrated and engaging story. I am really excited by the ideas I have already seen or talked about with students.

The 6th grade class just finished some microscope work to actually identify plant and animal cell parts. From here they are joining the two upper grades on beginning their work on the comic strip activity. Once again, this is another group to bring interesting and fun ideas into the activity.

The 5th grade is all but finished with the Earth, Sun, and Moon unit and will be taking a test in the coming weeks over all they have learned. Students have been expected to know the rotation, revolution, and tilt of the Earth and Moon. With looking at those, students are expected to know what those words mean and how they affect us every day.

The 4th grade has moved through learning about states of matter, physical, and chemical changes. Moving forward they will have a test in the near future over the material covered. Recently in class we also experimented with how vinegar and salt create an acid that removes the tarnish off of old pennies (Pre-1982) and how those copper particles can adhere to steel nails. It was a fun and exciting experiment for the students to do.

This has been a beautiful fall season and the class has learned so much and had fun exploring. The prek A kids had a wonderful trip with their fifth grade buddies over to the park. We all walked over and enjoyed a wonderful fall day and explored all the fall colors and different leaves. This all fits in with us learning the letter F for fall. They are all doing well writing and learning the alphabet.

Second grade has been very busy getting ready for First Reconciliation on December 4th. They are doing a great job learning the Ten Commandments, Sacraments, and Act of Contrition. The book and video Blessed, My First Reconciliation is awesome!

We took a little time outdoors to enjoy the beautiful fall foliage.





Mrs. Amanda Knauer: Religion, Math, Reading, Vocabulary/Spelling (4-5)

Fifth Grade: The fifth graders have been studying the Sacrament of the Eucharist. We discussed where the Sacrament comes from and the meaning behind it. We are now going through each part of the Mass and discussing in-depth why we do and say the things we do during the liturgy. During math, the students have been working on their decimals unit. They have learned how to read, write, order and compare them. We are now working on solving problems that include decimals. In literature, the students have been very excited about "Book Club." Each student is expected to read a portion of the book and complete a job that they will share with the rest of the group. The jobs will help the students with asking questions, connecting text, summarizing, finding, and learning the meaning of interesting words, and visualizing.

Fourth Grade: In math, the students have been diligently working on solving multiplication problems. I am so proud of how quickly and accurately the students can solve basic multiplication facts. During literature, the class is currently reading *There's a Boy in the Girl's Bathroom*. The students have enjoyed laughing about the characters and are discussing each part of the story in great detail.

Mr. John Bruno: Physical Education

Over the past few weeks, the students in physical education class have been working on Frisbee skills. They practiced a variety of lead up activities that broke down the different skills of this sport. The students worked with partners and in team games. The students have taken a liking to the Frisbee activities including: Frisbee golf, ultimate Frisbee, and no-outs Frisbee baseball. The primary students also played a game of pick up the trash, using Frisbees as trash. They worked in small groups and were timed during the game. They had a lot of fun!

The students are now playing field hockey. We have just completed working in stations and breaking down certain skills of the game. During the upcoming weeks, classes will be working on football skills. As always, I will continue to stress to all of my students that the main objectives of physical education are to get everyone active, to have fun, and to feel like a part of the class.

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Mrs. Christy Connor: Religion (6) Social Studies (4-8) English (8)

Religion: We are learning about Moses and how the Israelites received the Ten Commandments.

Social Studies 5: We are beginning to learn how the English colonies were founded.

Social Studies 6: The sixth grade students are looking at the ancient civilizations of India, China, and Japan.

Social Studies 7: In seventh grade, we are looking at the results of the American Revolution and how the United

States government was formed.

Social Studies 8: We are working on a timeline about the Panama Canal and will soon be learning learn about

the causes and effects of World War I.

Miss Ashley Schaaf Standard Math & Challenge Math (6-7-8) Pre Algebra, Algebra (7-8), Algebra II (8)

In standard math, we are identifying GCFs and writing fractions in different forms.

In challenge math, we are performing operations with fractions and decimals, as well as solving equations.

In pre-algebra, we are converting, finding, and applying percents.

In algebra, we are writing, solving, and graphing linear equations.

In algebra II we are simplifying rational expressions.

Mrs. Jennifer Runiewicz: Literature (6-8) Religion (7-8)

Literature classes have been reading A Separate Peace (8th), And Then There Were None (7th), and Tangerine (6th). All three are stories about mystery and life choices. These books will take us to the end of the quarter. Please encourage students to read every night. We will begin our Holocaust books when we return from Christmas break.

During this last month, 8th grade religion has focused on the Marks of the Church: One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic. In our next unit, we will begin to explore the history of the Church starting with the builders of the early Church. We will also learn about how Mary is the perfect example of what holiness looks like. 7th grade religion has been learning Jesus Christ the Truth, where we learned from teachings and examples of Christ how to live according to the commandments, the Beatitudes, and his new law of love, the Gospel, Our next unit, entitled Jesus Christ the Life, where we will study about the spiritual journey, a personal faith journey that is developed through a growing friendship with Jesus and that will be completed in the fullness of eternal life.
