#### Mrs. Katie Meier: Religion (5), Math (4-6), Vocabulary/Spelling (4-5)

4th Grade Math is working on sums and differences of fractions.

5th Grade Math is multiplying and dividing fractions.

5th Grade Religion is learning about the different parts of the mass.

5th Grade Literature is halfway through our second novel, Bud, Not Buddy. We are comparing and contrasting characters, analyzing settings, and playing with similes.



# Mrs. Christy Connor: Religion (6 & 8) Social Studies (5-8)

#### Religion:

In grade six religion, the students have learned about how the twelve sons of Jacob came to live in Egypt. In the next unit, they will find out about Moses and how he led the Israelites back to Canaan. Eighth-grade students have begun studying about the four Marks of the Church. They are currently working on the first Mark - one (or unity)

#### Social Studies:

Grades five and eight continue with American History. Both classes are learning about the English colonies and how the taxation of these colonies eventually led to the American Revolution. Grade six students are beginning their discovery of the geography and cultures of Europe.

Students in grade seven are learning about the geography and history of ancient China.

#### Mrs. Anne Stein: Standard Math & Challenge Math (6-7-8) Pre Algebra, (7-8) Algebra (7-8)

In the 6th Challenge math class, the students are working on solving problems with ratios and unit rates and will be starting to work with percentages.

In the 7th Challenge math class, the students are finishing up their unit on proportional relationships and are going to be studying circles.

The Pre-Algebra classes are finishing their unit on proportional relationships and similar polygons and will be learning about linear equations.

In Algebra, the students are working on solving systems of equations.

The Algebra II class is beginning their work with polynomials.

#### Mrs. Sioux Roslawski: Literature & English (6-7-8)

#### 6th-8th ELA

In literature, all three groups are either finished with their first book or are close. In English we are moving from memoir to informative writing. Students will begin a research piece.

And, with the beginning of November comes NaNoWriMo (National Novel Writing Month). Students will be writing a long story (6,000-8,000 words in length, depending on the grade level). The students get to choose the genre, and the most important component is the story. Keeping the plot going, and keeping the characters interesting... That's the fun part! There will be after-school sessions during the month for students to work on their word count. Look for an email this week.

#### Mr. Leonard Kraudel: Science/STREAM (4-5-6-7-8)

4th Grade Science are studying sound and light waves, the parts of waves and the different types of waves of the electromagnetic spectrum, along with a quick lesson on Identifying all the beautiful types of tree leaves of fall.

5th Grade Science are learning about Solutions, Homogeneous and Heterogeneous Mixtures, Colloids and Suspensions.

6th-7th-8th Grade Science are learning the Rock Cycle, the different types of rocks and names of common rock, and also learning about different minerals and the characteristics of minerals.

#### Miss Gretchen Decker: Art

<u>Preschool:</u> They finished Georgia O'Keeffe art topic then moved onto how color can be used to organize items and emotions! Then we finished off the month with how to draw a Halloween pumpkin and gluing together a Witch's Hat!

<u>K-3:</u> These students finished MrDoodle artwork and learned about Op Art! For the end of the month, they learned about Day of the Dead and made "Sugar Skull" while watching Coco.


<u>4–5:</u> These students finished their Foil Figures with Paper Mache and paint. Now, they are working Day of the Dead artwork by making "Sugar Skull" Masks while watching Coco!

<u>6–8:</u> These students finished up their Foil Figures and have started to paint mini pumpkins! Other students are also working towards their Year-long projects. They're really started to form well!



#### Mr. Jeff Klos: PE

Preschool A & B spent the majority of the month utilizing listening and directional skills while navigating through space and zones in the gym. They are doing a wonderful job!



#### Mrs. Jena Copeland: Music

We have been working hard advancing our skills in music in the month of October! Pre-K and Kindergarten have been using fruits and simple Halloween themed pictures to learn and feel rhythms. 1st grade explored body movements that coordinated with the songs they were singing (throwing scarves & tiny beach balls & doing "patty cake" hand claps with a partner). They also added the pitches DO and RE to their singing. 2nd and 3rd grade have both been hard at work learning half notes, whole notes, and the pitches DO and RE and singing them in various songs. We also explored the concept of singing while playing rhythms on drums that were different from the rhythm we were singing. 2nd and 3rd grade also explored coordinating "patty cake" hand claps to the rhythm of Hot Cross Buns. Last week, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grade took on the challenge of learning the song Pumpkin Pumpkin and then rewrote the melody using the pitches DO, RE, MI, SO, and LA- so fun! 4th and 5th graders have practiced singing basic harmony, singing while playing a different, more advanced rhythm on a drum, and have started learning the names of the lines and spaces on the treble clef staff.
